

Carol Bellringer	Carol Bellringer is the Auditor General for the Province of British Columbia and former Auditor General for the Province of Manitoba. Ms. Bellringer possesses an extensive background in conducting financial statement audits, performance audits, and investigations. A Chartered Professional Accountant (CPA), Ms. Bellringer holds a Bachelor of Commerce from Concordia University, Montreal, and an MBA from the Warsaw School of Economics/University of Quebec at Montreal. She is also a former Director of Private Funding at the University of Manitoba. Pat McCarthy	Pat McCarthy is the Washington State Auditor. She began her term in January 2017.
