


Space Plan for EPA Landover Warehouse,

1. This is GSA leased space
2. The overall square footage of the warehouse is 69,000 sq ft.
3. The square footage of office space in the warehouse is 60 ft x 30 ft.
4. There are no "bulk" or "bin" storage areas.
5. There are 49 storage racks (rows); 1,150 Sections of 8 ft x 5.5 ft.
6. The clearance between aisles measures 11 ft.
7. There are two secure area for sensitive items? Both are lockable cages. One measures 64 ft x 32 ft, the other 32 ft x 32 ft.
8. There are restroom facilities in the warehouse.
9. There is a break room in the warehouse. No appliances are provided, but may be made available from surplus inventory.
10. There is no GFP included on this contract. All warehouse equipment must be provided by the contractor.
11. The two bays in "Area D" are the loading dock.
12. Area "E" is currently being used by another contractor.

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

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

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# General Warehouse Conditions

- Corroded doors and jambs.
- Dirt, dust, vermin feces.
- Surplus items and copy paper stored in different places.
- Old computer bags molding and rotting.
- Many items unsecured on pallets/bindings removed.
- Many boxes opened on pallets.

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# Summary of Observations

- Warehouse recordkeeping system (Warehouse Management Module) is incomplete and inaccurate.
- System does not accurately reflect the warehouse's contents, condition and location; and includes no dollar value of the items, including new, surplus, or storage items.
- Warehouse is not adequately maintained.
- Warehouse is operating as a long-term storage facility filled with a considerable amount of unusable, inoperable, and obsolete furniture and other items.



# Summary of Observations

- There does not appear to be an efficient rotation of paper stock, resulting in outdated, damaged, and unusable paper, print shop materials, and supplies.
- There does not appear to be an efficient use of warehouse labor and storage space.
- There does not appear to be an efficient purchasing policy for low-cost, easily obtainable items.
- Warehouse personnel are using items for personal use.
- We also identified potential fire and safety hazards, as well as security issues.

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## Soldier admits to killing 16 Afghans

In plea hearing, Bates offers no explanation for 2012 civilian massacre

WASH. STATE — In an unapologetic, almost rote repetition of one of the most notorious of the Afghan war, Staff Sgt. Robert Bates on Wednesday acknowledged killing 16 Afghan civilians, killing 16 Afghan civilians, killing 16 Afghan civilians, killing 16 Afghan civilians.

He had little to offer in explanation for the killings.

When Bates, a military judge who had just come out of the March 2012 rampage, the 39-year-old Bates was neither apologetic in his response. He asked that question a half dozen times and there is not a single moment in the record for the homicide trials.

Sauer, accepted guilty pleas from Bates on charges of premeditated murder, aggravated assault with the intent to kill, and illegal use of steroids and alcohol at a U.S. military camp in Kandahar prior to his exchange; he will avoid the death penalty if he serves 15 years.

Bates, an Ohio native and father of two, had served four combat tours between 2003 and 2008. Bates' wife, their first, who had suffered a brain injury, was embittered by the posttraumatic stress associated with post-traumatic stress disorder. Bates ended his tour in the military in November 2008, after he left, it appears, after the Sept. 11 attacks, and he received a letter six years.

The stocky and balding Bates, who lives in Army senior status, began the hearing, 140 of the count Wednesday, that before the killings he had been examining the shooting. ## Report: Verizon giving call data to NSA

Court order may represent broadest U.S. surveillance effort

The National Security Agency appears to be breaking new ground in the amount of data of millions of American customers of Verizon, one of the nation's largest phone companies, under a secret court order that could represent the broadest surveillance authority known to have been granted. It also marks the first longstanding suggestion that the agency collects data from the United States and its foreign allies.

An order, which was signed by a judge from the secret court that oversees domestic surveillance, has just reported on the Web site of the congressional House Select Intelligence Committee, which is investigating the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks.

## Obama signals new approach on national security

In shuffle, Rice replaces Donilon as adviser

President Obama announced a major shuffle of his national security team on Wednesday, ushering out a cautious Washington line on a range of issues, including the president's proposal of a broadened American role in preventing human rights abuses.

The reorganized staff signaled the administration's shift toward a more assertive role in the world as it tries to settle on the role of a leader — and what priorities, at home and abroad, are likely to be shared in the face of stiff challenges on the domestic front that remained a question until his second term.

Donald E. Rumsfeld, outgoing chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, was relieved of his duties and was succeeded by Gen. Martin Dempsey, who has overseen the military's war in Afghanistan and seeks to stop future nuclear-imbalance programs.

In a brief statement announcing, Obama chose Rice, who does not need Senate confirmation, "a fierce champion for just

## EPA warehouse turned into workers' play area

They even had a "play room" where they could eat, drink beer and play cards. The workers, employees of Jones Logistics, the contractor that ran the warehouse, and the EPA's environmental audit team, had fun.

Also served: a mini-refrigerator and pop-up barbecue.

The more formal office buildings — situated by a 45-story office tower, called the Washington Center — were "more austere," according to the report, which found "no significant employee morale," according to a recently released investigation report.

All of it was revealed today in a report by the Office of Inspector General, which found that contractors and employees of Jones Logistics, the contractor that ran the warehouse, and the EPA's environmental audit team, had fun.



In This Audit because physically viewing the Train engines would prove very little, we determined another method to physically review the trains - Federally mandated Railroad logs

And we discovered :

*the repowered locomotives were not being used in the nonattainment area specified in the application. We reviewed the Equipment Event Activity report for the month of November 2010 for each of the five repowered locomotives. These reports show the locomotives' daily locations and movements during the month.*

The closest any of the GP40 locomotives traveled near Baton Rouge was about 100 miles; the furthest point from Baton Rouge was estimated at more than 400 miles.



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
