

Key Findings

2013 Audit of the Medical Marijuana Regulatory System



Licensing

- 37% of license we reviewed had potentially disqualifying information
 - Within 1,000 feet of school
 - Past criminal history
 - Tax delinquencies
- Average of 23 months to issue licenses (shortest 436 days; longest 807 days)
- No new occupational licensing appointments in the previous 6 months



Monitoring

"Seed-to-sale" model did not exist

- Database for plant tracking not completed
- No audits performed to verify inventories
- No video surveillance systems





Disposition of Unauthorized Marijuana

Taking marijuana from businesses 40 times in 2012

- As much as 15 pounds of finished marijuana product
- Division was not following statutes in voluntary surrender process
- Unclear how staff determined unauthorized plants






Financial and Strategic Management

Need for:

Systematic process for setting fees at levels that

correspond to the costs of licensing and monitoring

- Better staffing and spending plans
- Better controls over spending

Implementation of audit recommendations



Implementation of audit recommendations

The Department of Revenue agreed with all 42 audit recommendations and worked quickly to implement them

- Within the first 3 months, the
 Department implemented or partially implemented 2/3 of the recommendations
- By the next year, the Department implemented all the recommendations





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
