Biographies

Amy Adler

Amy Adler is the Controller for the Alaska Energy Authority where she has been employed since August 2000. Elizabeth Curda

Elizabeth Curda is currently an Acting Director on the Health Care team at the Government Accountability Office (GAO) where she has led audits of public health, biosecurity, and veterans' health programs. Previously, Ms. Curda was an Assistant Director on GAO's Strategic Issues team where she led audits and advised agency officials and GAO teams on the implementation of the Government Performance and Results Act, including the use of strategic planning, collaboration, and other leading performance management techniques to achieve results. Ms. Curda's wide-ranging body of work informed many elements of the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010. Outside of GAO, Ms. Curda is a board member and past chair of the Center for Accountability and Performance, a group affiliated with the American Society of Public Administration, which aims to improve the practice of public service by helping public administration and nonprofit professionals acquire the knowledge, technical skills and resources necessary to successfully manage for results. She is also a member of the Public Administration Review editorial board. Prior to GAO, Ms. Curda held senior analyst positions at the New York City Office of Management and Budget and the consulting firm, National Economic Research Associates. Ms. Curda holds a Masters in Public Administration from Columbia University and a Bachelor of Arts in Economics from Smith College.

Scott S Dahl

Scott S. Dahl was sworn in as Inspector General of the U.S. Department of Labor after being confirmed by the United States Senate on October 16, 2013. As head of the Office of Inspector General, Mr. Dahl is responsible for overseeing the administration of a nationwide, independent program of audits and investigations involving Department of Labor programs and operations. He



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also directs a unique program responsibility to investigate organized crime influence and labor racketeering corruption in employee benefit plans, internal union affairs and labor-management relations. Prior to his appointment, Mr. Dahl served as the Inspector General at the Smithsonian Institution. In addition, he has served in other senior positions in the Inspector General community first as Senior Counsel to the Inspector General at the Department of Justice. then as Deputy Inspector General for the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, and as the Deputy Inspector General for the Department of Commerce. Before joining the IG community, Mr. Dahl served in the Department of Justice as a corruption prosecutor in the Public Integrity Section of the Criminal Division and as a trial attorney in the Civil Fraud Section of the Civil Division. Mr. Dahl has received numerous awards for his government service, including the National Intelligence Superior Service Medal, one of the highest awards in the Intelligence Community. He also received the Attorney General's Distinguished Service Award. Concurrent with his public service, Mr. Dahl also served as an adjunct professor at the Georgetown University Law Center since 1992, teaching classes on professional responsibility and public corruption.

Corrine Eilo

Corrine Eilo is the Chief Financial Officer for the Denali Commission and is responsible for directing and overseeing the administrative, fiscal and human resource management of the Commission. She supervises the administrative, grant and financial staff and has oversight of contracted services that support the agency across all programs. Ms. Eilo serves as a member of the senior management team and has been with the Commission for 18 years.

Will Garber

Will Garber joined the Oregon Secretary of State Audits Division in 2000 as a Senior Auditor. He is now Deputy Director with responsibility for performance and information technology audits. In this capacity, he oversees a staff of 30 professionals who audit Oregon state agencies and programs for efficiency and effectiveness. His other responsibilities include testifying before legislative committees, presenting results of the Division's work to state agencies and other external parties, developing Division strategy and policy, training auditors, and reviewing performance and information technology audit reports to ensure they meet the Division's quality standards. Prior to coming to the Audits Division, Mr. Garber worked for ten years in the Seattle and Portland field offices of the United States Government Accountability Office. 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Michael E. Horowitz

Michael E. Horowitz was confirmed as Inspector General for the Department of Justice (DOJ) by the U.S. Senate on March 29, 2012 and sworn in on April 16, 2012. As Inspector General, Mr. Horowitz oversees a nationwide workforce of more than 450 special agents, auditors, inspectors, attorneys, and support staff whose mission is to detect and deter waste, fraud, abuse, and misconduct in DOJ programs and personnel, and to promote economy and efficiency in Department operations. Mr. Horowitz most recently worked as a partner at Cadwalader, Wickersham, & Taft LLP, where he focused his practice on white collar defense, internal investigations, and regulatory compliance. He also was a board member of the Ethics Resource Center and the Society for Corporate Compliance and Ethics. From 2003 to 2009. Mr. Horowitz served as a Presidentially appointed and Senate confirmed Commissioner on the U.S. Sentencing Commission. As Commissioner, he was instrumental in rewriting the guidelines for corporate compliance programs, and for fraud, antitrust, intellectual property, and money laundering offenses. Mr. Horowitz previously worked for DOJ in the Criminal Division at Main Justice from 1999 to 2002, first as Deputy Assistant Attorney General and then as Chief of Staff. Prior to joining the Criminal Division, he was an Assistant U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of New York from 1991 to 1999. From 1997 to 1999, Mr. Horowitz was the Chief of the Public Corruption Unit, and from 1995 to 1997, he was a Deputy Chief of the Criminal Division. In 1995, he was awarded the Attorney General's Award for Distinguished Service for his work on a complex police corruption investigation. Before joining the DOJ, Mr. Horowitz was an associate at Debevoise & Plimpton and clerked for Judge John G. Davies of the U.S. District Court for the Central District of California. Mr. Horowitz earned his Juris Doctor, magna cum laude, from Harvard Law School and his Bachelor of Arts, summa cum laude, from Brandeis University.

Wyatt R. Hundrup

Wyatt R. Hundrup is a Senior Analyst in GAO's Natural Resources and Environment team in the Seattle field office. Mr. Hundrup has led performance audits of programs in the National Park Service, Department of Energy, National Nuclear Security Administration, the Securities and Exchange Commission, and Nuclear Regulatory Commission. He has participated in other efforts outside his usual audit work, including being one of several people across GAO that reviewed the updated Green Book and helped develop GAO's internal training manual. He was also on a team of GAO analysts that developed a database of common criteria that can be accessed by all GAO analysts and helped assess examples of how those criteria are applied. Mr. Hundrup has worked for GAO for almost 15 years. Joining GAO in 2001, he has worked on performance audits in GAO's Physical Infrastructure, Homeland Security and Justice, and Natural Resources and Environment teams. He has also work jointly on several engagements with other teams in GAO, including the Center for Science, Technology, and Engineering; Defense Capabilities and



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Management; and International Affairs. Prior to joining GAO, Wyatt Hundrup worked as a Policy Analyst for the Society of American Foresters in Bethesda, MD, where he worked on federal natural resource policy issues. Before that, he worked as a Project Assistant for EPA's Region 2 Environmental Finance Center at Syracuse University and was also a Research Assistant for the Idaho Forest, Wildlife, and Range Policy Analysis Group in Moscow, ID. He has a Master of Public Administration from the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University and a Bachelor of Science in wildlife resource management from the University of Idaho.
