


CLOCKSPEED: The Rapid Pace of Change Will Require “Agile Auditing”


UNCERTAINTY & COMPLEXITY: Interconnected Risks Will Require “Anticipatory Auditing”




Today's Efforts Will Shape the Audit Office of the Future
