


Setting the Stage

The Importance of Elections

- The Constitution established the U.S. as a democratic republic.
- It is democratic because the people govern themselves, and it is a republic because the government's power is derived from its people.
- A secure and resilient electoral process is vital to the national interest.








The American Election Administration System

- Decentralized
 - States and local jurisdictions run elections - There are more than 50 election administration systems
- Non-uniform
 - Election administration systems vary from jurisdiction to jurisdiction and from state to state.
- Thousands of jurisdictions
 - Over 6,400 jurisdictions




Election Infrastructure

- Election infrastructure is designated as part of the nation's critical infrastructure.
- Election infrastructure includes, but is not limited to:
 - Voter registration databases and associated IT systems
 - IT infrastructure and systems used to manage elections (such as the counting, auditing and displaying of election results, and postelection reporting to certify and validate results)
 - Voting systems and associated infrastructure
 - Storage facilities for election and voting system infrastructure
 - Polling places, to include early voting locations

Threats to Election Administration



- Can be intentional or unintentional
- May originate from within the U.S. or from overseas

Current Threats



- Mis-, dis-, and mal-information
 - Misinformation may consist of false rumors and misconceptions about elections, while disinformation could be targeted messages spread to purposely mislead voters
- Cyber operations targeting election infrastructure, political parties, campaigns, or public officials
- Threats against election workers

Paper Shortage

- Paper is essential for ballots, ballot envelopes, voter registration forms, etc.
- Long term trends exacerbated by recent market factors have put the nation's paper supply at risk
 - Costs rising by 40% or more
 - Paper orders that once took days or weeks now take months

Goal


 Ensure safe, accurate, fair, and accessible elections

- However, each approach is designed to ensure information security, physical security, cybersecurity, and continuity of operations in the event of a disaster.

CISA

- Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA)
- Lead federal agency in charge of election security
- Operational component of the Department of Homeland Security



Federal Election Commission

- Regulates election activity
 - Candidate behavior
 - Campaign finance



NIST

- National Institue of Standards and Technology (NIST)
- Operational component of the **Department of Commerce**
- Key roles:
 - helping to realize nationwide improvements in voting systems
 - assist with the development of voluntary voting system guidelines



Office of Director of National Intelligence

Coordinating authority for the intelligence community on election security



FBI

Investigates federal election crimes




Department of Justice

 Detects, investigates, and pursues violations of federal civil and criminal law

Help America Vote Act





- Also known as HAVA
- Enacted by the Congress to make sweeping reforms to the nation's voting process
- Established the EAC
- Improved voting system and access issues identified following the contested 2000 presidential election
- Created new mandates for states to follow in several key areas of election administration

- Bipartisan
- Selected by Congressional leaders of the majority and minority parties
- Appointed by the President
- Confirmed by the U.S. Senate

EAC's Strategic Goals

- Strengthen American elections through the development and implementation of responsive and dynamic voting system guidelines and cyber resources for election officials.
- Encourage improvements to election administration through the development and distribution of resources that assist election officials in modernizing American elections.
- Create operational excellence throughout agency management and programming.





- VVSG are specifications and requirements against which voting systems can be tested to determine if the systems meet required standards
- VVSG 2.0 was unanimously approved by the EAC Commissioners in February 2021
 - paves way for next generation of voting systems across the country
- The EAC is currently working on the implementation process

Clearinghouse Division



Clearinghouse division consisting of eight SMEs

- Division consists of former election officials and experts on election administration, election law, and accessibility
- Led the creation of additional guidance documents to address best practices and respond to election official challenges in a timely manner

HAVA Election Security Funds



- Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2022: \$75 million in Election Security grant funds
- Total Election Security grant funds to date
 - \$380 million (2018)
 - \$425 million (2020)
 - \$75 million (2022)
 - \$880 million Total
- 52% expended for the 2018 and 2020 funds as of June 1,
 2022

HAVA Election Security Funds

- Election Security funds are intended to improve the administration of elections for Federal office, including to enhance election technology and make election security improvements.
- Budget categories include:
 - Voting equipment replacement and upgrades
 - Election auditing
 - Voting registration systems and management
 - Cyber vulnerabilities
 - Training
 - Communication
 - Other

OIG's Role



Federal OIGs

 Federal agencies have their own OIGs whose duty it is to combat waste, fraud, and abuse in the programs and operations of that agency.

 In the Election space, coordination between OIGs is key.



Role in Good Government



- IGs look independently at problems and possible solutions.
- They issue fact-filled reports based on professional audit, investigative, and inspection standards.
- They provide technical advice as new plans are developed.
- They can perform independent investigations of allegations.
- IGs maintain hotlines for employees and others to report confidential information regarding allegations of fraud and abuse.


 Mission: To safeguard the Federal investment in our electoral system by conducting objective and meaningful oversight.




OIG Hotline

Coordination – Georgia

- In March 2022, the Georgia Department of Audits and Accounts issued a <u>report</u> that covered the office's administration of HAVA funds.
- The auditors found the Secretary of State office needs to improve compliance with federal grant requirements and implement an adequate system of internal controls related to its contracting and procurement activities.
- Rather than duplicate the work of the State auditors, EAC OIG will perform an audit in FY23 to ensure the corrective actions were implemented.
