




OAG initially created as an elected office in 1836

FIST - Established in 2017

Article IV, Section 53 of the Michigan Constitution

OAG Authority

Article IV, Section 53 of the Michigan Constitution "The auditor general shall conduct post audits of financial transactions and accounts of the state and of all branches, departments, offices, boards, commissions, agencies, authorities and institutions of the state established by this constitution or by law, and performance post audits thereof.

The auditor general may make investigations pertinent to the conduct of audits."



How to Report Fraud/Waste/Abuse Allegations to the OAG

Information provided to the OAG via the hotline or other methods may result in an investigative or performance audit or other review. Please provide as much detail as possible (describing who, what, where, when, why, and how) to allow us to fully evaluate your allegation. You are not required to identify yourself. However, please understand that submitting information anonymously may limit our ability to obtain additional information necessary to evaluate your allegation. We will handle any information you provide in the most confidential manner allowed by law. However, it is important to emphasize that circumstances may exist under which the OAG is legally obligated to reveal your identity, such as if your allegation is referred to a law enforcement agency.

The OAG does not normally advise individuals who have filed allegations of the existence, status, or outcome of an investigation. Generally, we will only contact you again if we need additional information or clarification.


The OAG does not represent or act on behalf of any individual or agency and cannot provide legal advice. If you are seeking a legal opinion or representation, you should consult with an attorney.

- + Allegations the OAG Investigates

- Allegations related to insignificant matters or those without sufficient factual basis.





FIG. 17 TO WHOM DID WHISTLEBLOWERS INITIALLY REPORT?






Complaints by Year





Who is Contacting Us?






How are People Contacting Us?






