Patrick has spent more than a decade leading and supporting performance audits at the Office of the Washington State Auditor, where his work has strengthened public accountability, improved government operations, and enhanced services for Washington residents. His portfolio spans major areas of state government, including health care, education, transportation, financial systems, digital access, and statewide workforce and infrastructure challenges.

He has contributed to audits examining Medicaid eligibility processes, alternative learning programs, data security practices, school immunization compliance, unemployment system performance during the pandemic, long-term care workforce training, tolling system modernization, and the state's enterprise financial system replacement. More recently, he has evaluated Washington's digital equity initiatives and the administration of digital navigator services designed to close access gaps.

Patrick is currently leading an audit assessing Washington's progress toward a whole-of-state approach to cybersecurity, with a focus on governance, coordination, and long-term resilience across state and local governments.

He holds a master's degree in public administration, and his work reflects a sustained commitment to transparency, program integrity, and ensuring that essential public systems operate effectively and equitably for all Washingtonians.

In that capacity, he directs the Office’s performance audit program which was established through a 2005 citizens’ ballot initiative. He also oversees the Office’s consolidated IT audit function, which includes data analytics, systems audits, and cybersecurity audits. Prior to coming to Washington, Scott worked for the Kansas Legislature for nearly 20 years, including serving as the State’s fifth Legislative Auditor from 2010 to 2018. He has served on the executive committees for several national and regional audit organizations, including the National State Auditors Association. Jungjin is an Executive Director of Intergovernmental Audit Forums within the Strategic Planning and External Liaison (SPEL) team at the U.S. Government Accountability Office. She manages the Comptroller General's Domestic Working Group (DWG), an advisory group of federal inspectors general and state and local audit officials, and GAO's Domestic Relations portfolio for the mountain and plains, pacific northwest, and western regions.

Jungjin has over 15 years of audit experience and has served across multiple mission teams at GAO, auditing the federal government's budget and tax policies, data governance and government-wide management issues most recently. Jungjin also served as the main Senior Analyst on GAO's 2017 and 2019 High-Risk Series, a biennial report that is updated at the start of each new Congress on programs and operations with serious vulnerabilities to waste, fraud, abuse, or mismanagement, or in need of transformation in the federal government.

Prior to working in the federal government, Jungjin worked on corporate alliance programs at UNICEF, conducted international economic research at the Samsung Global Research (formerly known as the Samsung Economic Research Institute), and served as the Auditor-in-Charge at the City and County of San Francisco. She holds a B.A. in Political Science from University of California, Berkeley, and a M.A. in International Affairs from Columbia University. Jungjin is a California native and currently resides in the bay area with her husband and son.
